

Message from the Mayor

Yukon government, through the Municipal Act, has enabled local government for two primary purposes 1) to provide, within its jurisdiction, good government for its community and 2) to provide services, facilities or things that a local government considers necessary or desirable for all or part of its community. The Municipal Act also enables the election of Mayor and Council to represent the community as a whole and make decisions on the community's behalf.

Amongst the more important roles and responsibilities of elected leaders is to set high-level strategic direction. In other words, Council needs to figure out how best to invest limited resources to address community needs and wants. To achieve this strategic direction, Council is given the authority, through the Municipal Act, to set policies, levy taxes, guide growth and development, and set budgets. In response, it is the role of staff to provide Council with apolitical information, guidance and analysis to support their decision-making, and to develop comprehensive, tactical plans to deliver on their direction.

With this in mind, early in our mandate Council hired Christina Benty, an accomplished community leader and mentor, to lead our newly elected governing body through a Strategic Planning exercise. We asked ourselves what we wanted to accomplish over our three-year term and then assessed what would be realistic to accomplish within this time frame with available staff and financial resources.

This progress report summarizes the progress made against the goals that we set early in our mandate. In some areas we made great progress; in other areas, and for a variety of reasons – such as the arising of unanticipated opportunities or challenges -- we didn't make as much progress as we would have liked.

This report stands as a record of this outgoing Council's accomplishments in hopes that the incoming Council will pick up, learn from, and see value in this process and move forward with their own strategic planning and priority-setting with good information on where this Council left off.

Message from the CAO

Village staff are fortunate to have a Council that provides a clear Strategic Planning and strong leadership. This Council has been diligent in ensuring its decision-making processes are based on the most accurate and complete information available. This has led to efficient governance and effective municipal operations. One critical initiative from Council was to fill vacant position and increase staff capacity, this has resulted in the hiring of new positions furthering staffs' ability to provide critical services and expanding services offered to the community. These positions include:

- Policy and Communications Manager, replacing the Corporate Administrator position with vastly increased responsibilities
- Project and Asset Manager (3yr term). This position is outside funded through HAF and is focused on affordable housing initiatives, asset management, and GIS development
- Recreation and Events Coordinator position has been approved by Council and is currently seeking confirmation from the Union

The past three years have presented Council with numerous challenges. Council has worked to maintain progress on their initiatives while managing unavoidable turnover, which is particularly impactful in small organisation. Early in Council term, considerable time and energy was directed towards the response to COVID. Due to historical challenges much of staff's energy has been devoted to addressing a large backlog of policy and bylaw concerns. These factors together have resulted in some of Councils priorities not being addressed in this term. This report outlines Councils successes in competing its strategic plans, and clearly indicates where staff have struggled to achieve Councils vison.

2025 looks to be a productive year for the Village. The administration is eager to complete ongoing major projects as well as other goals included in this report. As we approach the upcoming election, this report will serve to provide continuity between the outgoing and incoming Councils. Council has directed staff to prepare a transition package for the incoming Council which will further enable the new Council to smoothly transition, while allowing opportunities to chart their own Strategic plans.

The summary table on pages 5 and 6 provides a high-level overview of progress towards each Strategic Planning Initiative.
